HEADTEACHER'S UPDATE

At the end of another busy year at St. Edwards School, this newsletter is a celebration of the vibrant educational life of our community. There have been so many achievements this year, both individually and collectively. Our academic performance last summer placed us significantly above the National Average for GCSE outcomes, and we continue to perform strongly in terms of our students' destinations to secure next steps, from Russell Group Universities to exciting career opportunities.

In this newsletter you will find our new Mission Statement. This is the product of wide consultation and reflection, and captures the essence of what makes St. Edward's unique and distinctive. My thanks go to the various colleagues, Governors and students who contributed to this process. We will begin a comprehensive roll-out of our new Mission Statement from September. In moving forwards as a school, I am always mindful of those who have contributed over the decades that have passed since we first opened in 1963. It was a real pleasure to welcome back Mr Alan Murphy, St. Edward's second headteacher; who oversaw the growth of the school from its small beginnings as a Catholic school,

to the start of the partnership with the Church of England in the 1990's. His vision was of a Catholic school, and an Anglican school, working in partnership to practice ecumenism. We are grateful for his 18 years as

headteacher, in building the foundations from which we continue to grow and flourish.

Our students continue to amaze us with their skills and potential. From the 30 students who were awarded their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh award, to Rock Challenge and Battle of the Bands; and most recently our Talent Show; we recognised how blessed we are to work with such wonderful young people.

Our staff, too, have celebrated various successes, from coaching and leading winning teams in sports and technology, to more personal achievements. In June I was delighted to present a special award from the Royal Humane Society, founded in 1774, to Elodie Roux and Lucy Mitchell, who saved the life of a colleague during a staff training day in September. The award commemorates their having "restored a woman to life", and words are insufficient to express the magnitude of their quick thinking service.



Many of you will be aware that Sara Sinaguglia, Head of History, was presented by the National Pearson's Silver award for Teacher of the Year in a Secondary school. As one of ten national finalists she now goes forward to the finals in Central London in October. We congratulate her, and wish her every success. Thank-you to the parents and students who supported

her nomination.

The summer break ahead gives staff and students an opportunity to unwind and take stock. Meanwhile works will continue on site, and we have a programme of developments that will continue to enhance the resources and potential of our school.

The end of the summer term is also a time for farewells, and we say goodbye to Mrs Sherman, Mrs Moxley, Mr Newman, Ms Hodder, Mr Richards, Mrs Foote, Mr Williams, Mrs Dearden, Mrs Berry, Marie Willis and Mrs Hayward. On your behalf I thank them for their excellent contribution to St. Edward's, and wish them well in their next steps.

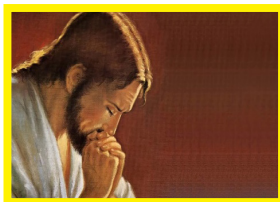

CONCEPTS UNDERPINNING THE NEW MISSION STATEMENT

The working groups sought to establish a mission statement that captured the expressed views of the whole school community regarding the mission and purpose of St Edward's School. Unity in community stood out as one central feature our school expressed. The working groups decided to build the new mission statement on the foundation of John 17:20-23, where Jesus has just prayed for His Disciples, and now turns His thoughts to all who will believe as a result of the preaching of the Good News:



"My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me, and I am in you. May they also be in us, that the world may believe that you have

sent me. I have given them the glory, that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one – I in them and you in me – so that they may be brought to complete unity. Then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me" (GNB)

ART

We have had a very busy summer term, which started with GCSE and A level exams. The students worked very hard towards their exams and produced some exciting and creative final work.

An impressive exhibition of 'A' level art, Photography and GCSE Art work was exhibited at the end of June. Students, parents, friends and staff celebrated the amazing achievements at the private view. Mrs Theresa Moxley who is retiring this year, was invited to make the selection for the Josh Taylor Memorial prize. This is a prize that is awarded each year in the memory of a former student Josh Taylor. This is the seventh year that we have been awarding the prize and it was lovely to see Mr and Mrs Taylor and Josh's brother Joe at the private view to present the prize to the winner: Hannah Quine. We are so pleased that 9 of our Art and Photography A level students have gained places on the Art Foundation diploma at the Arts University, Bournemouth for September.

On Friday 14th June we took 55 of our GCSE Year 10 and A level Year 12 students to visit the degree shows at

the Arts University Bournemouth. They were bowled over with the range of work exhibited from the many different arts degree courses that are available to study at the AUB, including make up for TV and film, animation, several different Photography courses, Fine Art, Textiles, Architecture and many more.

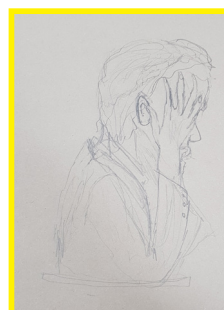
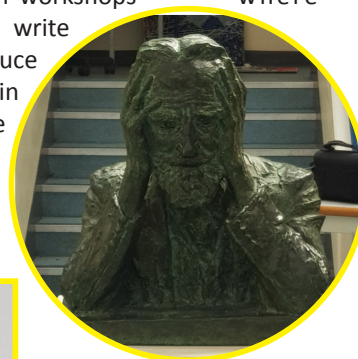
A group of 9, Year 10 GCSE Art students are attending a 3 day summer school hosted by AUB; they will be studying courses in Fine Art, Photography, Interior Architecture and Visual Effects, (VFX) at the university campus.

We also have 9, Yr12 Art and Photography students taking part in a four day summer school this term hosted by the AUB. The students are studying courses in Fine Art, Fashion Branding and Communication, Model making and Drawing.

Preparations are underway for our Art trip to Paris next October. Students will be visiting some of the major galleries and museums in Paris and will also get to visit Monet's garden in Giverny.

In early July the Art department were fortunate enough to gain funding to take part in the sculpture UK: Masterpieces in schools project. We were lent a bronze sculpture for a day by the Russell-Cotes museum in Bournemouth of the playwright George Bernard Shaw sculpted by the artist Kathleen Scott [wife of the explorer] in 1930-40. Approximately 80 students were able to take part in workshops where they could write and produce Art work in response to the sculpture.

CAREERS UPDATE

It has been a very busy year for Careers Education at St Edwards this year. The highlight was undoubtedly the Careers Fair that we held in March. At this event we were joined by over 35 different exhibitors from a range of employers such as Cobham and JP Morgan, and further education providers including Southampton University. During the course of the day every student in school attended the fair and had the chance to talk with all the different exhibitors.

There have also been some other notable highlights across all of our Year Groups. In Year 9, 60 students were involved in the DASH programme run by Young Enterprise. During this the students involved were able to get expert employability advice from local business leaders, and make work place visits to some of those businesses. Another group of Year 9 students have successfully completed the "World of Work" led by Aaron Rigby our independent careers advisor.

Year 10 students have benefitted from going through a programme of writing letters of application and CV's and then have mock job interviews. This has really helped them to prepare for their work experience that is due to take place in September. Thanks to Southern University Network for the funding of £10,000 to run the Young People Index Programme in Year 12 and also the World of Work OCR programme, run by our Careers Advisor.

In Year 7 the focus has been on the key themes of employability and financial literacy. This was further developed in Year 8 where we also use outside speakers and presentations to help the students to begin to consider choices and options. Year 11 students were given advice and one to one interview to support them in making important decisions about their futures.

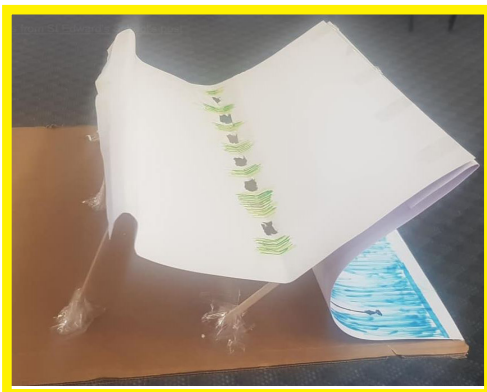

COMPUTER SCIENCE

Recently Year 7 have been considering the importance of online safety as we have looked at the attempts by hackers to 'phish' your details from you using Trojans and malicious emails. It was good to see that most students scored highly in our 'can you spot the phishing attack' email but the lessons should hopefully set students up to be wiser when it comes to using the internet.

Year 8 have begun learning how to use a text based programming interface and code in Python. We looked at how to get it to draw some fun shapes using turtle graphics and have been moving on to iteration loops to get them to draw some detailed and patterned shapes.

Students in Years 7 and 8 have been learning for the first time this year how to build and program robots using Lego Mindstorms; applying their knowledge of Computer Science to problem solving and the wider world of artificial intelligence. The learning project has been well received by students with many opting to spend extra time after school developing their projects. We are working hard on developing a fantastic curriculum for the second year of 'Robotics' bringing in elements of the TV program Robot Wars (not with weapons, sadly) and increasing the depth of learning and challenge.



Year 9 continues to be part of the rotations in Technology with students following a similar programme through the year but we were most impressed with 2 groups of students in Year 9 who entered and were incredibly successful in the Poole Harbour STEM challenge where students needed to use BBC microbits (miniature computers). The

girls won outright, with the group of boys getting a special commendation.

GEOGRAPHY

KS3 GEOGRAPHY

GCSE GEOGRAPHY

Year 11 students were taken to Boscombe to undertake the fieldwork element of their GCSE Geography course. They were focusing on finding out how successful the regeneration attempts had been. The visit started in Shelly Park in Boscombe Manor, where the rustling of the leaves was the only thing to spoil the tranquillity. This was directly contrasted against Boscombe Crescent by using the same environmental quality

survey technique. Next came the bit the students were most looking forward to – the perception survey, which insisted that the students approach members of the public for their views on the regeneration scheme. My apologies if you were enjoying a peaceful shop on Boscombe High-street that day, and were approached by a clipboard wielding GCSE Geographer, your answers were not in vain. Conclusion reached after painstaking analysis, the regeneration has principally helped the already affluent areas of Boscombe.

The Year 12's will also be sitting their first exam alongside them in Human lifespan development, which covers physical, intellectual, emotional and social development across the human lifespan and the factors affecting development and the effects of ageing. Once they have completed this unit, they will complete their first piece of coursework. The year 13's will then complete their last piece of the course on their second piece of coursework exploring the support for individuals with additional needs. Wishing you all a restful and enjoyable summer break and we look forward to welcoming you back in September for the next chapter.

HISTORY

As we come to the end of a busy summer term in the history and politics department at St Edward's, we reflect on the efforts of our Year 11 and 13 students in the GCSE and A level exams. With new specifications being undertaken for the first time in politics and only the second time in history, students equipped themselves well through steady and focused revision, taking full advantage of the resources available both in school and online. Despite another challenging set of exam papers, students can be proud of their calm and mature approach, creatively considering complex questions demanding specific knowledge and evaluative thinking. We have been delighted to see our first ever cohort of politics students complete their two year cycle of study and exams and embrace every opportunity: hearing Germaine Greer speak at the Tivoli in Wimborne, grilling the Speaker of the House, John Bercow, in a live link to the House of Commons, visiting the Supreme Court and the Houses of Parliament and appearing on BBC2's Politics Live. As ever, in education, we are already looking forwards and have our next trip to Westminster lined up for September, when no doubt the Brexit debate will still be at the forefront of parliamentary business!

Our year 12s have had a busy year too, with history and politics students again capitalising on a rich offering of extra-curricular and subject enhancing opportunities. Lily Morgan and Lowri Bradley, both studying history and politics at A level, worked hard to place 160th out of 700 teams nationwide in the first round of the Kingsley Napley 'Legal Apprentice' competition, before going on to register creditable placings in three subsequent rounds. A valuable experience for both students who were able to sample the complexities and demands of legal counsel with a top law firm. The European Parliament elections in May presented our year 12 politics students and two year 10s, also with a keen interest in politics, an opportunity to attend the vote count at the BIC. As we approach the 75th anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz concentration camp, we have embarked on a collaboration with our colleagues in the Art department to enter GCSE art and history students in the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust, 75 Memorial Flames project. Year 9 students have been researching the history and individual stories, poetry and words of the Holocaust at history club in preparation for an art project in September when they will create their 'flames' to enter in to the national

competition. Our Year 12 historians have also been exploring beyond our curriculum and considering the theme of racism and other types of intolerance in the context of rising far right politics and amplified forms of nationalism. Jess Maple was one of the students who attended the 'Hate/Humanity' day at Southampton University: "I learnt so much about the impact that prejudice has on the society in which it is expressed, the accounts and literature written and the interpretation of historical discoveries, especially in terms of those in relation to the development of the human race. While the lectures were at least an hour long, they did not feel that long because they were so interesting. We had three lectures: 'Nuremburg and Now: Remembering the Nazi Past', 'Neanderthals: 150 years of prejudice', 'Antisemitism in the Ancient World'. The most interesting, for me was definitely the last as it highlighted the prejudice faced by the Jews throughout history." Clearly, an important reflection and one that has prompted us to consider the treatment of minorities and migrants within our own society across all periods of history that we study here at St Edward's.

And finally, we had a wonderful time taking our Year 10 students to the Battlefields of Belgium and France to support their understanding of conflict in the First World War and reflect on the sacrifice of so many young lives. It is always a privilege to take St Edward's students on trips knowing that they will represent both themselves and the school with great dignity and humanity. Next year promises to be even more inspiring than this one: we have a new history and politics teacher starting with us, Miss Elms, who studied history and politics at the London School of Economics. We are planning more trips and

visiting speakers, in particular expanding on our 'Ask the historian' experience, where we get professors of history from leading institutions to answer our students' questions on their specialist period. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the parents and carers who support our students with their wider engagement in history and politics, we are starting to reap the benefits of rich discussion and increasingly inquisitive young minds questioning the world in which they live.

MATHS

KS3

As we come to the end of the year, students in Year 7 are working on the final modules of the research study we are taking part in with Manchester Metropolitan University, Realistic Mathematics Education (RME), for this year. Students in Year 8 have been taking part in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge and their results were impressive. Particular congratulations go to Matty Giordano who was best in school and achieved a Silver certificate, and Jerome De La Cruz who achieved a Bronze certificate. Looking ahead to next year, some of our current Year 7 will continue to take part in the RME trial and this will become more embedded for the rest of the year group and for the new cohort coming in. We also intend to take part in a National Maths Competition in the Autumn, with workshops being held in school in November.



KS4

At Key Stage 4 we have said farewell to our Year 11. They have worked hard

this year and we are hopeful the exam results reflect this. Year 10 have been revising and working on their mocks. This will be the first time they have tackled a GCSE paper in a formal setting. Once completed they will get a complete list of topics that will be individually tailored for each pupil, this will allow them to work on the gaps in their knowledge. In September we will see the launch of a new KS4 scheme of learning that will ensure all topics are covered by the spring mocks in Year 11 allowing the final stretch of their time at St Edwards to be focused on revision and problem solving. Enrichment opportunities available next year at KS4 will include various workshops from celebrating women in mathematics to group activities which will bring maths concepts to life. These will sit alongside the annual Maths Challenge.

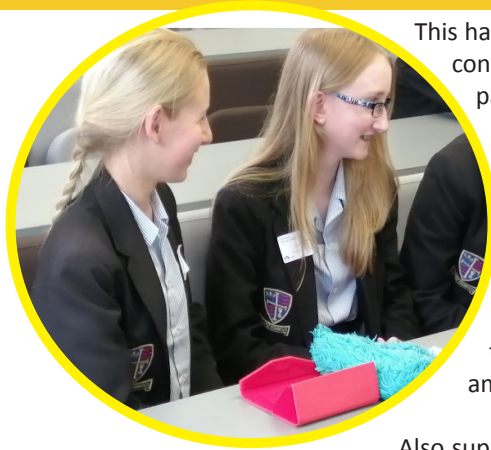
KS5

At Key Stage 5, this year was the first examination of the new specification A level. We have been very pleased with the hard work and preparation that our year 13 students have put in. It was also the first time we have had a Core Maths cohort be examined and again they have worked hard throughout the year to

get to this stage. We wish them all the best of luck with their results. We are really excited to welcome a new cohort of students next year, both for A level and Core Maths. Core Maths will now be teaching 2 of the optional units to enable students to play to their strengths a bit more in terms of options, with one option linking very closely to psychology and biology themes and the other having a more business and economics theme. A level Maths is now well set up for the new specification with so many more resources available to both us and the students to enable them to all reach their potential. The most noticeable change for next year is a dedicated A level Further Maths group, who will take their A level Maths at the end of year 1 and the A level Further Maths at the end of year 2. This will enable the students to access and get the most out of the Further Maths course, which is strongly valued by both Universities and Apprenticeships. The students doing Further Maths will then also get to choose their optional modules as a group, something not every Sixth Form is able to offer!

This has been a typically busy term for the languages department. Alongside the usual routine of conducting speaking exams at GCSE and A-level and preparing students for their final written papers we have run several enrichment opportunities for students. Most significant was the second leg of this year's French Exchange, with the group from our partner school in Cherbourg having arrived in Poole on the 15th May for a one-week stay. During the group's time here they visited Bath, Lulworth Cove and Durdle Door and Stonehenge/Salisbury and as usual were exceptionally well looked-after by their St Edward's host families. Our exchange partnerships are a unique opportunity for our students to develop their understanding of the world, form new friendships and develop the languages skills that are so prized in the modern, inter-connected world they live in. This autumn will see the 20th iteration of our German Exchange with the Gymnasium am Kaiserdom School in Speyer.

Also supporting the theme of the importance of languages, Mr Lenarduzzi took a group of 10 able linguists in Year 10 to a study day at Southampton University on the 13th June. As well as providing the opportunity for our students to practise their existing skills, students also learned some ab initio Mandarin and Portuguese, and were spoken to by senior academic staff and recent graduates about the enhanced opportunities available to graduates of all disciplines who are able to speak more than one language.

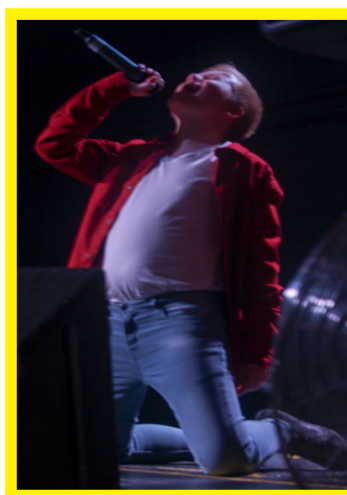
MUSIC



The music department have been as busy as ever this term. As well as all the usual exams for KS4 and 5 students we have been working towards a talent showcase in collaboration with the PE Department. PSHE

As PSHE's profile continues to grow in significance in the National Curriculum - including its reintroduction as a compulsory provision for both primary and secondary schools - we look forward to further developing our comprehensive and enriching provision for students at St Edward's. Having only recently taken over the role of PSHE Coordinator, I am excited to build current and modern schemes of work on a multiplicity of topics, through which students will learn

how to engage with a variety of aspects of the world around them in a safe, secure and confident manner.

As we continue to structure our overall curriculum for next year, students currently are focussing on their engagement with ideas of careers, personal finance and planning for the future. For Key Stage 3 this has comprised of financial education in budgeting, making secure transactions and applying a financial perspective to

their long-term dreams and goals, both in school and beyond. 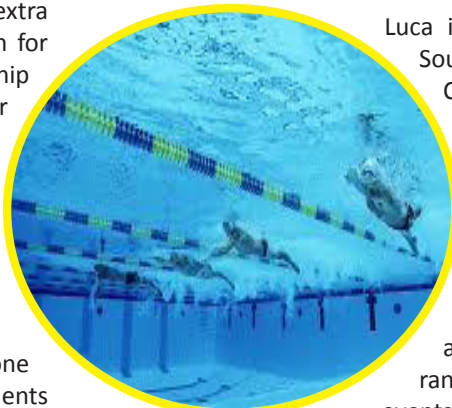
Results...

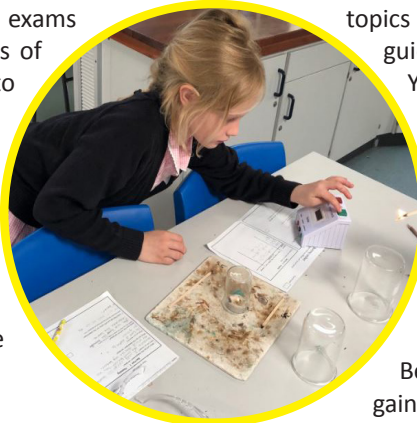

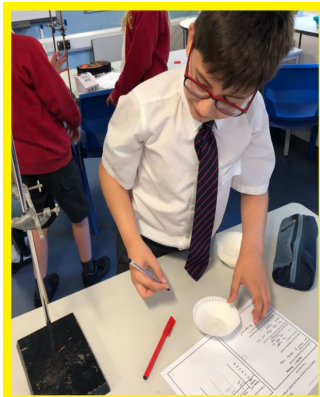

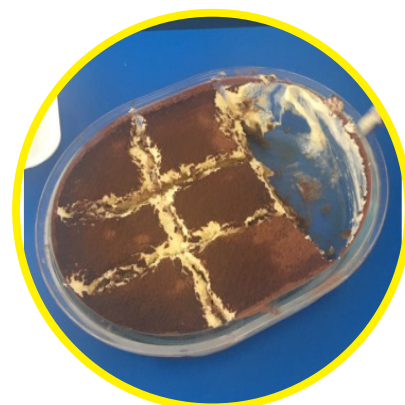
partnerships and students have been entertained by the opportunity to pose questions to Mr and Mrs Farrow about the division of labour in their own family!

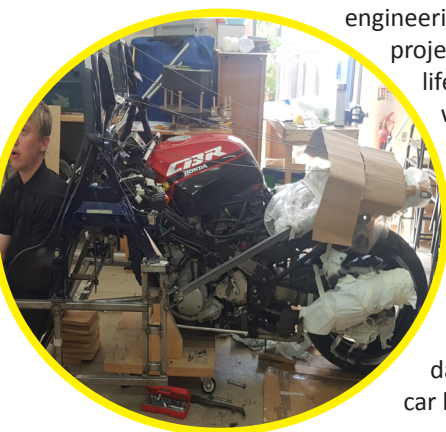

TERM TIME HOLIDAY

Regulation 7 of the Education (Pupil Registration, England) 2006 Regulations has been amended to prohibit a Head Teacher granting leave of absence to a pupil except where an application has been made in advance and the school considers that there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application.

When a leave of absence is taken and the school has not authorised the absence, the school may request that the Local Authority issues a Penalty Notice - please be aware that where previously the Local Authority fined one member of the family, BCP Council are now issuing fines per parent, per child. Therefore the Penalty Notice has the potential to rise to £120 per child.

A Penalty Notice may be issued:

- Where a parent has taken the pupil on a leave of absence during term-time without the school's authorisation and there are unauthorised absences of at least 10 sessions (5 school days), or
- If more than one period of absence is taken during term-time within any 12 month period without the school's authorisation and there are unauthorised absences of at least 10 sessions (5 school days) overall, or
- Where the school has agreed to a specific number of sessions of leave during term-time due to exceptional circumstances, and any additional sessions of unauthorised leave have been taken outside of the agreed period.

All leave of absence requests must be made in writing, marked for the attention of Mr Antram. St Edward's, in line with other schools in BCP, requests fines for term time holidays.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARDS

This year has been a huge success for the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze award. We have had the highest rate of completion from our current Year 11's and taken on a double enrolment of Year 9's and 10's, which means we have 95 students currently participating in our Bronze award.

For our Year 9's and 10's this year's expeditions have now been completed; even with adverse weather conditions the students powered through and all passed this side of the award. The dedication and hard work that each student has put in to their volunteering, physical and skills section has been outstanding.



Our current Year 11's attended an amazing awards evening hosted at Poole High which our local Mayor presented the awards to our well deserving students. This evening was enjoyed by all who attended and we hope next year's will be just as much of a success.

PUNCTUALITY

To support good punctuality in school we will be making the following changes to the arrangements for arrival at school in the morning:

All students who are arriving at school after 8:45 will be asked to enter the school through the gate at the front of the school by reception. A member of staff will be present on this gate from 8:45 -9:10. This does mean that the back gate will be locked at 8:45.

Any student who is late to school on more than one occasion per half term will be given a sanction.
