English

This term Year 7 have been studying literature based around the theme of pirates as part of our Sail the Creative Seas unit. Students have created and sung their own sea shanties and read a range of poetry and fiction. Some have visited our new Forest School space to rehearse and perform their own scripts based on the characters, Jim and Ben Gunn, from Treasure Island.







Year 8 have been reading a range of crime and detection fiction. They have also been creating some fantastic mini-sagas: 100-word story from the villain's point of view and a selection of these will be entered into a local writing competition.

This term we have introduced our fortnightly enhanced reading classes to the whole of Key Stage Three. Working in small groups, students read and discuss a range of engaging novels. The novels have been carefully chosen for individual students and are aimed partly at fostering the joy of reading whole novels. Students look forward to these lessons; we have had some positive feedback from Year 9 students especially, who have really enjoyed the opportunity, making comments such as: 'We really like the idea of reading in groups' and 'I am so excited about our next lesson reading!'. The teachers have enjoyed listening to the groups read and discuss too, especially those who have given their characters expressive voices.


We are also running an extra-curricular reading club for KS3 students which is held in E3 on Wednesdays from 3.15 to 4pm. The group is currently reading The Bone Sparrow by Zana Fraillon. All are welcome.

Year 10 have been enjoying 19th Century novels this half term: A Christmas Carol or Jekyll and Hyde. In preparation for their mock post-16 interviews with members of The Rotary Club, which will be held in school next half term, they have also written a Curriculum Vitae, an application form and covering letter.

We would like to congratulate Year 11 and Year 13 on their positive approach to the English mock examinations. There are many GCSE resources available online including https://www.gcsepod.com. Revision activities are set by English teachers and students can also access this excellent site for their own revision.

We celebrated World Book Day's 25th year on 3rd March with a range of different activities for all year groups. A World Book Hunt took place over the week in the LRC for KS3; there was a great turnout for Year 7 students especially. KS4 students took part in a Campus Book Trail that had them hunting for clues related to different books across the school campus. Sixth form students enjoyed a silent debate and read and added to book recommendations. Tutor groups competed to match the teacher to their favourite books (well done to 7NMO). Throughout the day, teachers also introduced their students to a book that is dear to them.





A tutor reading programme has been rolled out this term in KS3. Years 7 and 8 have an exciting range of texts covering different topics and genres. Year 9 are encouraged to bring their own books in and/or explore a range of texts with their tutor.

This term, staff have displayed posters letting students know what book they are currently reading to encourage reading for pleasure.

We are keen to get students exploring the texts on offer in the LRC or using the BookTrust's Bookfinder search tool which will help them to discover their next good read.

Religious Education

It has been a very busy term in the RE department!

Since Christmas, Year 7 have completed their study of 'Does God Exist?', which included a variety of arguments from a wide range of key scholars, and are now looking at a series of Old Testament figures as they move through a unit entitled "Who are the 'People of God'?"

Year 8 have completed units on "What is love?" and have now moved onto a unit where they are learning about the meaning contained within a number of Jesus' parables.

Year 9 students particularly enjoyed their unit on "Why is there suffering?" and are now finding out about the various reasons why political and religious leaders of the day wanted to kill Jesus. The GCSE and A-Level classes have been continuing with their examination courses and in the case of Year 11 and 13 students are now busy revising for their March PPEs and their final examinations after Easter.

We have once again benefitted from visits from Dave Pegg and his team from The PACE Trust, they have been into school and have delivered lessons to Year 7 and Year 9 RE classes on the themes of "Does God Exist?" and "Who killed Jesus and Why?". Year 8 students have also really enjoyed getting out of the classroom and had a lesson visiting the Chapel for Adoration led by Sr. Alex and some reflection activities in our Forest School area organised by Harry Vincent (a member of our school chaplaincy team).



There is much more planned too as we are hoping to have a visit from someone that recently completed a pilgrimage to Lourdes and also from two Jewish Rabbis to talk to Year 11 students about the similarities and distinctions between Orthodox and Reform Judaism.

Links with junior schools

A focus of our KS3 coordinator has been to improve our understanding of how to best support, and challenge, pupils who join us in Year 7. Members of the Maths team have visited junior schools in Poole, and they have come to us too! This experience is enabling us to modify our approaches and we are seeing positives for the pupils from this collaboration

Core Maths taster morning

A number of Year 10 students attended a virtual Core Maths taster morning run by Advanced Maths Support Program (AMSP). The event was supported by current year 12 Core Maths students. The aim of this taster was to give pupils an insight into what studying Maths beyond GCSE could be like, and what opportunities gaining an advanced Maths qualification could open for them.

Support for Students

In KS3 we have been offering intervention during registration for pupils with the highest need. This is really well attended and we will continue to rotate this so all pupils of need are supported. In KS4 the offer of Maths revision on Thursday after school has been received well by students of all abilities and we will continue to offer this until their exams. Intervention for KS5 are run twice a week afterschool and once again are really well attended by students.

We also hope you find the individual question level analysis for end of term and mock assessments useful for KS3 and KS4 pupils. We have sent close to 1000 of these individual documents to students so far this year!

Next Term


UK Junior Maths Challenge - Students from the top sets in year 8 will be taking part in the UKMT Junior maths challenge. We hope they enjoy this enriching opportunity.

Year 10 Spring Term Assessment - Due to Year 11 mocks and KS3 assessments, the Year 10 spring assessment will take place after Easter. A revision guide for this assessment has been posted to Teams for pupils.

Sparx Homework

Year 7 and Year 10 have been part of a trial of Sparx, our new online homework software. Sparx is a more intelligent software than Hegarty, due to inbuilt Al. It is also linked to the student's learning journey, meaning 60% of the homework will be practising what they are currently working on in class, the other 40% are recall tasks from past topics. This means students receive individual homework that is challenging, yet achievable for them. In the first 6 weeks of the trial this has resulted in:

- The median number of questions answered increased from 70 in Hegartymaths to 135 in Sparx
- The proportion of students not engaging with homework dropping from 54% to 8%
- Improved note taking for homework, thus practising method, due to imbedded bookwork checks. 8555 bookwork checks were completed.

One of the most important aims of our curriculum in Languages is to open students' eyes to the opportunities available to those who are able to communicate in more than one language, and it was with this in mind that we invited our A level linguists to join the Sixth Form Conference, hosted (virtually this year) by Southampton University in January.

Our students heard from presenters about the opportunities available to young people who learn languages and enjoyed lectures in French and German, delivered by university academics. Later in the term these students were joined by future A level languages students in Year 11 and aspiring linguists from other years to watch a presentation by Adam Kettle-Williams, First Secretary at the British Embassy in Paris, on his role in the Foreign Office, international careers and the benefits of learning languages. This further emphasised the benefits of languages in supporting students' life experiences and career potential and we are very grateful to Andy Elliott, Director of Learning for 6th form, for arranging this experience for our students.

Meanwhile, younger students in Year 7 continued to enjoy the letter exchange with our German partner school in Speyer, which they started in the autumn term. We expect to extend and continue this in future years, whilst also re-starting our long-standing and hugely successful full foreign exchange trips to France and Germany. Watch this space!

The Sixth Form Conference at Southampton University

This term has of course also been busy in the classroom. With our Year 12 A-level students we are beginning the cinematic and literary study elements of their course.

German students have begun a study of the film "Goodbye Lenin!", an award-winning portrayal of the impact of the fall of the Berlin wall on life in East Germany, whilst those in French are studying "La Haine", a hard-hitting and breathtakingly-effective film that holds a mirror to modern France's social and economic divisions.

Our GCSE linguists have been studying the many festivals and traditions in French and German-speaking countries and learning about their school systems, whilst Year 7 students recently began study of their second language here at St Edward's. We look forward to welcoming all of our students back to lessons after their well-earned Easter break.


History

The Spring term has brought new and enriching opportunities for students of history at St Edward's. On the 26th January, Year 9 students and their teachers were able to join an online commemoration of the Holocaust, organised by the local branch of the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust and hear from survivor, Henry Schachter. Henry was born in 1939 and only survived the Holocaust because he was a 'hidden child'. Now living in Bournemouth, Henry shares his story raising awareness of the events that led to his parents death and that of six million European Jews, as well as the millions of victims of Nazi persecution, including homosexuals, Roma people, disabled people and prisoners of war.

Henry told of his parents move from Germany to Belgium and their selfless act of handing him over to a Christian nursery school teacher, who took in 3,000 Jewish children and found homes for them with Christian families. It was at this point that Henry, aged three, born Ariel Schachter, was renamed Henri Dufet. He recounted his last memory of his mother visiting him, on his fifth birthday, and the discovery that both his mother and father had died just before the liberation of the concentration camps.

He spoke of how he was reunited with his uncle, entirely by chance, and his relocation with family to England, where he built a life and family. Henry is passionate about sharing his story with the next generation and it was a great privilege to hear from him and know that his story, like that of other survivors, will continue to be told by the young people of St Edward's school. We hope to welcome Henry in person as soon as the opportunity presents itself, at which point our Year 13 photography students will be capturing a portrait of Henry to share with future generations here at St Edward's.





More recently, our year 9's have been exploring the British Empire through a multitude of sources held on the National Archives database. They have been exploring Sathnam Sanghera's assertion that "there is very little about British empire that is certain or knowable, the books I consult teaching me, among other things, that Britain's relationship with its colonies varied across the globe and over time." Students have been encouraged to explore Empire through a variety of lenses, and we would like to consider the legacy of empire at a local level, here in Poole. We are planning a project, with advice from Bournemouth University and the Dorset History Centre, which will build an archive of oral history from families who travelled from the Commonwealth to Poole. We would be interested to hear from any students and their families who would like to contribute to this project.

A reminder that all of our students have student membership of the Historical Association, which allows them access to podcasts, articles and book reviews. These can be found at www.history.org.uk, student username: 54826 password: edwards1234. Please encourage your child to access this rich and exciting resource at home.

There is also a reading list from the Historical Association of historical fiction, on the history SharePoint site, which can be used alongside our curriculum.

Geography

Key Stage 3

As well as finding out about the impact that large sporting events have on changing places, groups of Year 9 students have been producing convincing and persuasive presentations that support a bid for the host city of the Winter Olympics. Year 8 have been studying about the causes and effects of mass extinction events, and have been asked to consider how best to conserve the natural world for future generations to enjoy.

Year 7 continue to impress with their enthusiasm to discover more about the world around them, it was fantastic to see how confident many were in giving their weather forecasts, based on their learning about the UK weather and climate.



Key Stage 4

Year 11 have just received their pre-release booklet, this year focused on the issue of disposing of our waste. It is making us think about what can and cannot be recycled as well as some of the frustrations for those of us that are trying to look after the planet. A well-crafted booklet, that will have a life long impact on our actions. Year 10 are starting to look forward to the reintroduction of fieldwork as a compulsory part of the GCSE course.

Key Stage 5

Via the Changing Places topic, Yr 12 students are preparing for their first piece of fieldwork, a study of the impact of urban regeneration in East London. They are trying to convince Mr Kemish that a trip down the longest slide in the world is fundamental to their understanding of a sense of place, time will tell if they have been successful!

Year 7

Year 9

Our Year 9 students have been studying the sculptural piece, 'Shoes on the Danube Bank' as part of the school's Holocaust Memorial Day commemorations. This piece of art was created in memory of the victims shot into the Danube during WW2. A small group of Year 9 students are now making their own sculptural piece at Art Club to mark Holocaust Memorial Day, incorporating Year 9 prints and drawings of their own shoes and the words and testimonies of child Holocaust survivors. We are looking forward to seeing the final piece on display in the atrium by our History department.







Year 10

Our Year 10 artists were excellent ambassadors for St Edward's on our recent trip to Poole Museum and Old Town Poole. Students spent the day selecting individual artefacts that they found of particular interest and recording their observations through drawing, photography and text. They will now use this research to inform their art work back at school.

Year 11

Our Year 11 artists are now working hard to complete their portfolios. They produced a diverse range of exciting and varied final outcomes during their recent extended time and are now putting the finishing touches to their work ready for submission and marking after Easter.

Year 12

We were very impressed with both the creativity and critical thinking of our Year 12 artists when exploring the theme 'Identities in Art'. Our students joined an online lecture led by Dr Atsuhide Ito a leading academic and artist working with Solent University. They were then set a brief where they were asked to create art work in response to the lecture and submit digital photos of their work. The students then took part in a second live debate where some of the submitted work was selected by Dr Atsuhide Ito to be analysed and discussed. A range of work was selected from the submissions from schools and colleges across the UK. A number of artworks completed by our students were selected for discussion and all of our students contributed insightful and personal comments to the live debate.

Technology



Spring term is always a busy time in Technology as students in KS4 and 5 complete their internal assessments ready for submission to the exam boards.

Year 11 GCSE Food students completed their practical assessment following the brief to design healthy dishes for young children aged 0 - 4. The practical exams were run over 2 days and the students worked very hard to produce an array of high-quality dishes. The range of dishes included main meals, deserts and snacks. Students made their own pasta producing tagliatelle, lasagne and ravioli. They also portioned chicken and fileted fish using a wide range of labour-saving electrical equipment and produced dishes with a very high level of finish and garnish.

Year 10 Resistant Materials students have been developing their wood working skills by designing and making contemporary bird habitats. Students have had to develop their ability to mark out effectively, cut and drill with precision and join materials with accuracy.

At KS5 the Engineering students visited Cobham/Eaton in Wimborne to find out about careers in engineering and to see what a local multinational engineering company actually looks like.

The students were given a tour of the manufacturing and testing facilities by the Director of Operations. Students were also given a talk by 5 engineers in different roles within the company, including the Development Engineering Senior Director, to learn about what they did and their career routes. This was the first of 2 visits with the second after Easter.





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Dragon's Den

Congratulations to 6th Form students who have chosen to take part in the Young Enterprise competition this year. They are continuing to do well, and are demonstrating their commitment, creativity, determination, independence and entrepreneurial flair.

Young Enterprise is an international competition where students set up their own Private Limited Company and run it from October until April. This month the team took part in a Dragon's Den Event at Clayesmore where they pitched their business idea to a team of investors. They received excellent feedback and advice and are looking forward the to Dorset Heats next month.

Science






Great tit has laid 4 eggs in school bird box

Physical Education

This term we trialled a new Health, Fitness & Well-Being unit within our PE curriculum. We felt that students needed a different unit that offered them an opportunity to experience a variety of fitness classes, first aid and some knowledge and understanding of how to training safely to avoid injury. We trialled this new unit with our Year 7, 8 & 9 students for 4 weeks in January.

The fitness classes consisted of Strength and conditioning, Body Pump, Circuit Training, Zumba and Spinning. Within First Aid the students learnt basic CPR, recovery position and treatment of cuts and burns.

At the end of the unit, we asked the students how they found their first experience of the unit and we are pleased to report that they all had a positive and exhilarating experience:

100% of students said that they enjoyed trying something new and alternative from the PE curriculum.

90% of students said that they would like to try fitness classes outside of school.

85% of students felt physically and emotionally better after participating in one of the sessions

Due to the success of this year's Health, Fitness and Well-Being unit, we will be running the unit again next year for more students to experience the unit with different classes and further opportunities to progress in training.



Our students have worked so hard in multiple fixtures this term, with all years now playing a variety of fixtures. We have also played all of our county qualifying tournaments with huge success with our Years 7, 9 and 11 team qualifying to the next round of counties.

Netball Club has been amazing this year and we wanted to thank all students who have come to club and trained with us. We've had some fantastic teams come through and we are hoping to get more fixtures and opportunities to more students next academic year.
