The summer term has seen the creation of a new sensory room behind the Eden Centre, and ahead of us we have the total refurbishment of the RE suite of classrooms, the main staffroom, and the LRC. Additionally we plan the centralisation of IT suites in the sixth form block, the relocation of Psychology within the Science area, and additional space being allocated to Art for 6th form work. There have been many hidden developments in our IT infrastructure, increasing the speed, stability and efficiency of our IT network. My thanks go to our IT team who work tirelessly to build our IT capacity as a school, enabling students and staff to work in ever more interesting, efficient and exciting ways. Other planned developments include the renovation of the amphitheatre, so that it becomes an attractive and safe social space for students. At the time of writing we are awaiting the return of tenders for the new dining hall, hoping against hope that the rising costs of steel will nonetheless keep the costs within tolerance, and that we might finally be able to commence building work in the months ahead. I am so grateful to so many generous families who have contributed towards our building fund, and the many offers of help. There has been such an incredible amount of kindness and support for what we are trying to do as a school. Thank-you so much.

The curricular provision for our students remains strong thanks to the leadership within subject areas. Our students have benefited enormously from the consideration that has been given to ensuring curricular coherence, relevance to the world in which they live, and application to the future that they are preparing for. BCP's appointment from September of a Navigator for our school, Shelley Burns, will further help us to engage the support of families and help from external agencies in trying to ensure that the curriculum meets the needs of every student. The Navigator role has been established in all schools across BCP with the purpose of brokering services, and making connections between school, home and the Local Authority. Our wider curriculum has continued to be enhanced by the widening of access to our forest school provision by increasing numbers of students. This space is used for learning, the development of wellbeing, and deepening of spirituality. I am grateful for the work of Harry Vincent, and members of the school community who have given their time and skills to further enhancing this special part of our campus.

I know that at a time of year when thoughts usually turn to holidays and relaxation, many of our families are beset by worries and preoccupations. We have been doing our best to help where we can, and do please let us know if you are struggling with the costs of uniform or food for your family, as we may be able to provide additional support for you.

I hope that the summer ahead provides some brightness for you and your loved ones, and we look forward to working with you in the Autumn term, when school resumes.

# **English**

As the school year comes to an end, we remain relieved and thankful that we have been able to teach English in school. Over the last two years, we have certainly learnt a lot about teaching and learning online but nothing replaces shared reading and writing, discussions and debates. I think this joy has prompted our active approaches to learning this term and students have enjoyed drama activities to further enrich their understanding of texts in English in the fantastic new woodland area and the fully equipped Drama studio.

Year 10 and Year 12 students have been preparing well for their end of year exams. We have introduced GCSE students to the revision resources on GCSE Pod where they have been revising their 19th Century novels (A Christmas Carol for some and Jekyll and Hyde for others). We have made a provisional booking to take GCSE students to the GCSE Poetry Live event in Bournemouth in March 2023 and we will be writing to parents and carers about this opportunity in September.

Our KS3 students have been involved in so many fantastic opportunities this summer. In particular, the new Woodland Area teaching facility at St. Edward's has been the ideal location for our students to immerse themselves in our study of plays this year.

Firstly, Year 7 have been studying Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. As part of this beautiful unit based on love, dreams, fairies and anything wonderfully mysterious. Students have had the opportunity to visit the woodland area and experience aspects of the play in many different ways. 7L EN3 looked at some non-fiction writing and recreated the trick that two girls played on the public regarding the finding of fairies. Some of these recreations can be seen in the pictures below (Thalei Rawamila and Lacey Moore). The writing aspect of this unit has been the purpose of writing to advise in addition to writing descriptively.

All year 7 students have studied the poem 'Tables Turned' by William Wordsworth and were taken to the woodland area to consider the lines,

'And hark! how blithe the throstle sings! He, too, is no mean preacher: Come forth into the light of things, Let Nature be your teacher.'

Several students then responded to the ideas in the poem in amazingly imaginative ways, through writing their own poetry, narrative or description pieces. Some of which were entered into our school competition (winners to be announced!)

As part of our 'Trapped' unit, Year 8 Have been studying Mary Shelley's Frankenstein; adapted to a play by Philip Pullman. The students have been excited by their introduction to the gothic genre and learning about the context in which gothic stories and poems were written. While covering ideas surrounding animal rights, Year 8 classes have had the unique opportunity to explore a variety of texts and resources through audio and video documentaries; several classes have planned, written and recorded their own documentaries on a range of issues faced by animals today.

Continuing the 'Trapped' theme, this unit has also included some non-fiction reading and writing around ideas of animal entrapment, such as zoos, animal rehabilitation, as well as animal cruelty and animal testing. Students have had opportunities to discuss their ideas on these topics and have written persuasive pieces in the form of articles.

Year 9, this term, have taken on the challenge of the novel 'The Woman in Black' by Susan Hill. New to our English key stage three curriculum this year, the novel has captured the imagination of even our most reluctant readers! Hill's atmospheric novella is about a mysterious woman who haunts an English village surrounded by marshes and sea fog. It is a marvellous introduction to similar novels they will study as they enter Year 10 in September and develops ideas from their work on Frankenstein in Year 8. Students have considered how Hill crafts her writing to recreate writing that is reminiscent of the 19th century as well as considering how she builds ideas and character that are in keeping with the gothic genre.

# **Religious Education**

Year 7 students have completed their study of "Who are the people of God?" which focused on a range of Old Testament figures and have now gone on to explore the theme of diversity through an in-depth study of Hinduism which also featured some interesting discussions on the topic of animal rights. We have also been delighted to have recently completed a joint trip with the History department to Salisbury Cathedral where Year 7 students enjoyed a tour of the cathedral and sessions on the legacy of the Magna Carta and Medieval Scribes. This has served as excellent preparation for their 'Who Are the Social Justice Heroes' unit of work.



Recently, Year 8 have focused on the concept of 'Dukkha' through their study of Buddhism and have been considering the Buddha's response to what causes suffering and what the cure might be. Year 8 students have also benefitted from sessions delivered by PACE (Programme for Applied Christian Education) where they spoke about the Christian response to abortion and the advocacy of adoption as a possible alternative in some circumstances. Year 9 have completed their in-depth study of Sikhism, with an emphasis on the importance of equality and the oneness of God. Year 9s have also recently had a follow up session to their residential retreat at St. Cassian's Retreat Centre in Kintbury that was led by our school chaplaincy team in which they were given free rein to ask any questions they could think of; questions ranged from "What is your favourite film?" to "Why would God let innocent people suffer?" It was an excellent opportunity for students to ask questions that are central to their spiritual development in a safe and non-judgmental environment.







Year 10s have been busy preparing for their end of year exams. The absolute majority of them are doing really well in RE with some of them surpassing their GCSE target grade already. Year 11 have now completed all of their final GCSE examinationss and started the wait for their results. We would like to thank them for all their hard work in RE and wish them all the best for the future. We are delighted that a large number of students expressed their intention to study RE at A-Level!

Year 12 have recently become enthused by arguments both for and against the legalisation of euthanasia and by their focused study of the problem of evil and suffering and the evaluation of possible responses to it. Year 13 RE A-Level students students have completed their course and their final examinations; we would also like to thank them for their dedication to the subject and wish them well with their future endeavours. In Personal Enquiry, the Year 13 course ended at Easter to allow students to focus on their preparation for their final examinations but 12 students have relished opportunity to discuss controversial issues such as 'Should animals have the same rights as humans?' and 'Are we always responsible for our own actions?'. They also gained insight into the topic of Human Trafficking as they received a talk from a guest speaker from the Salvation Army.

Thank you to all students for their hard work and resilience this year and we wish them a safe and happy summer!

What a year, and how amazing the Year 11s have done in completing their public exams this year. To be the first cohort back in the big sports hall sitting those papers was no mean feat and they did it in such high spirit! Right up to the last minute they were coming along to revision clubs after school, (some perhaps drawn in by the biscuits..?). # **Modern Foreign Languages**


This year we have worked to increase the use of authentic resources in MFL lessons, which are designed to increase students' exposure to social and cultural elements of countries where the language they are learning is spoken. This is achieved through the integration of video clips and authentic texts into our lessons, and we also teach specific units and topics to help students to learn something of the history and culture of relevant countries.

This term we have delivered a unit to Year 9 German students that covers the Cold War, including watching the film "Ballon", which tells the true story of the Strelzyk family who escaped East Germany in a hot air balloon in the late 1970s. Students studying French have been learning about the Normandy region and have studied the classic French film "les choristes", a moving tale set in a French boarding school for disadvantaged children.





This work to increase opportunities for cultural learning was recognised by the Prince's Teaching Institute, who again this year awarded our department their Subject Leadership Mark, a national accreditation which recognises excellence in learning both within and outside the taught curriculum.





Perhaps the most exciting work we have been undertaking this term is to re-establish our long-standing exchange links with our partner schools in France and Germany. We will be able to tell you more about French and German Exchange 2023 when we return from our summer break in September.

We hope all students have a fantastic summer and look forward to seeing them again in September.

# Art

### Year 7

The year 7 students are now ready to transition to the year 8 art course having spent this term exploring the rich cultural arts of Japan. In particular the students have responded through painting and mixed media to Japanese cherry blossom studies, through resist techniques to Hokusai's Great Wave and through drawing to Manga.

### Year 8

The year 8 students have been exploring the theme of the portrait. They have developed their drawing skills recording shape and proportion accurately before exploring how a range of artists have explored the theme of the portrait in their own way. The examples here show how students have responded to the work of Leger. Students have also looked at the work of Picasso and alongside his portraiture work they have discussed and responded to his anti-war painting Guernica.

### Year 9

Our year 9 students have been exploring the theme of African art, responding to a range of African pattern work and African masks. Now that the year 9 artists are completing their Key Stage 3 course, we look forward to welcoming those that have selected Art to their GCSE course in year 10 and wish all of year 9 the best of luck on their chosen courses.

# Art

# **Technology**

### Students found sumo wrestling in Technology lessons!

The traditional Japanese sport of sumo wrestling usually involves two hefty people wearing little more than a mawashi (a large "nappy") attempting to push each other out of a small ring. A few years ago, an enterprising engineer realised that this could form the basis of an interesting robot competition and robot sumo wrestling became an international sport. The rules are simple: two robots of similar size and weight try to shove each other out of a small area and the last robot remaining is the winner.

Robotics students in year 7 have had an opportunity to build and program robots to do exactly that! Students could opt to add a light sensor to detect the white line, an ultrasonic sensor to detect objects in front robot, or both. Their robots were then customised to improve their 'shoving' capabilities.

To be able to do all this requires students to be able to program, design and build their robots and helps them see how rewarding robotic engineering can be. Te wo tsuite (fight!)







# Completion of the first cohort of KS5 Engineers




# **Science**

# Parent Voice Feedback

Earlier in the year we asked parents and carers for their views on the school. We asked about their experience of the online parent teacher consultation evening, and while some said they missed the opportunity for the face to face meetings, the majority said they found the online consultation system more convenient as they were able to book appointments around other commitments. Over 80% agreed they were easily able to make appointments with the staff they wanted to see and over 98% said the feedback was helpful and constructive. You also told us that the online system meant that the evening ran to time and appointments didn't overun.

A number of you reported that the length of the appointment was too short. The length of the appointments remains unchanged from when we had face to face appointments, however the system does ensure that all appointments keep to time. Unfortunately, were we to extend the lengths of appointments, it would reduce the number of people teachers would be able to see and make it harder for you to meet a broad range of teachers. As soon as we started to get the feedback about appointment length we opened up the facility for typed comments. This allows parents and carers to add notes ahead of the meeting, alerting teachers to specific issues they would like to addess. We hope that we can further refine the process to ensure the time is as effective as it possibly can be.




# My child is happy at this school

When asked about progress, again we got a similarly positive response with over 90% of parents and carers agreeing with the statement.


We know that one area where parents want additional support it homelearning and we are planning to make it easier for parents to track and support this through the SIMS app next year.

# When I have raised concerns with the school they have been dealt with properly.



# Sociology

It has been hugely rewarding preparing our Year 13 students for their summer exams; the first public exams they have sat as a cohort and our first Sociologists since the subject was introduced at the school to be externally assessed. Nearly the whole group came in for a fast-paced revision day in half term with endless snacks helping to fuel progress! With only a few curve-ball questions in the much-anticipated final exams, it was pleasing to see confident and relieved students after their three papers and we look forward to finding out their results in August.



At the start of the Summer term, lots of our Year 12 Sociologists took the opportunity to spend time at the University of Southampton enjoying a Sociology and Criminology taster day. Students were able to attend sessions such as Beyond Labelling Theory: Crime, Technology and the 'Sticky' Identity and Why should Sociology study non-human animals? Speciesism, power and the social construction of others. Campus tours were also available. The day provided lots of food for thought for those considering their next steps after A-levels.



Y12 have made fantastic progress with the new curriculum model in place this year; Mr Farrow has been teaching Research Methods alongside the studies of Education (Autumn Term) and Families and Households (Spring Term) with Mrs Farrow. This has enabled us to provide a substantial revision period in preparation for the end of Year 12 exams. It's been great to see a good number of students attending the additional revision sessions during study leave too.

As Sociology continues to grow in popularity we are moving to two blocks in Year 12. The students who attended the sessions in Sixth Form Induction week engaged extremely well with our exploration of the micro vs macro and conflict vs consensus approaches to Sociology.
